



PUBLIC POLICY AND INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT PROFESSIONAL CAREER IN BC

OVERVIEW

The work of an International Development professional (IDP) focuses on discrepancies that exist between developed and developing nations and looks at the complex social issues and developmental challenges facing many contemporary nation states. International development professionals work to reduce or eliminate poverty in developing countries.

International development professionals work as activists, community workers, and union reps; or in politics, as a lobbyist, policy analyst, or administrator. They may work as correspondents, journalists, and editors for the mainstream press as well as global affairs journals. Others work with any organization that concerns itself with alleviating global poverty, inequality, and suffering. A non-governmental organization (NGO) is a non-profit, unaffiliated agency, usually occupied with a particular social or political issue (E.g. Oxfam or international agencies such as Global Affairs Canada, Amnesty International or United Nations bodies).

EDUCATION, TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

A bachelor's in economics, human rights, or social policy is a foundation to completing a master's in international development.

A combination of work experience, volunteering, and a master's degree in international development (or a related field) are crucial to working in this sector. Traveling to developing areas to work within the communities you wish to help will provide valuable insight.

Skills required include problem-solving, communication, cultural sensitivity, and sociopolitical awareness.

Employers may look for 2 - 3 years of related experience that may include:

- developing, researching, and/or analyzing policy, regulation, and/or legislation.
- managing policy projects and/or project components in a multi-faceted stakeholder environment.
- writing for an executive/senior-level leadership audience (examples include reports, policy concept papers, presentations, briefing notes).
